Organization Description:

The Program for Humanities in Medicine at Yale School of Medicine offers a lively, meaningful, and provocative approach to the art and practice of medicine. The medical humanities can enrich our lives in medicine, increase our ability to observe, help us understand perspectives other than our own, shed light on community concerns, expose our assumptions, and provide a means for grappling with the inherent uncertainty in medicine. We strive to use the medical humanities as a springboard to raise the critical consciousness of our community. Through a wide variety of opportunities, both curricular and extracurricular, we hope to stimulate thought and discussion about the narratives we tell about our patients, ourselves, and the systems we work in; the traditions we have inherited; the role we play in questions of justice; and what futures we imagine for ourselves as a profession.

GPE Fellow Responsibilities:

We are seeking a fellow with a background in the humanities and an interest in health/medicine to work with us on a variety of ongoing and new projects. The main focus would involve assisting the leaders of our new concentration in medical humanities for medical students. The two tracks are "Critical Health Humanities/museum education" which is led by Dr. Robert Rock (senior advisor to Program for Humanities in Medicine) and Cyra Levenson (director of education and public engagement at the Guggenheim Museum), and "Writing for the Public" which is led by Dr. Randi Hutter Epstein. The fellow would also be expected to craft original

content for our newsletter and to be involved with the Program's speaker series, annual creative writing and art contest, and other ongoing activities.

Desired GPE Fellow Qualifications:

We are looking for a fellow with strong written and oral communication skills, along with initiative and organization. The fellow should be able to work independently and enjoy working with teams.

GPE Fellow Learning Objectives:

The fellow will have the opportunity to play a significant role in the seminar series for both concentration tracks with students and others interested in the critical health humanities. Collaborations with existing programs and other departments and schools as well as the community will be encouraged.
