[Kameron Austin Collins](#) is a writer based in New York City. Previously a staff writer and lead film critic for *The Ringer* and for *Vanity Fair*, Kameron currently works as a film critic for *Rolling Stone*. He is also a regular crossword constructor for *The New Yorker* and *The New York Times*. Kameron is a graduate of Harvard University and was a Ph.D. candidate in English at Princeton University, where he was an associate of the program in Law and Public Affairs and taught courses both in the English Department and the Center for African American Studies.

[Cassius Adair](#) is an independent radio producer, writer, and researcher who currently serves as Visiting Assistant Professor at NYU's Department of Media, Culture, and Communication. He is also a research fellow at the Digital Research Ethics Collaboratory at the University of Toronto, an outside member of the Precarity Lab at the University of Michigan, lead producer of the podcast *Transcripts*, and has worked as a story consultant or script editor for major literary and media projects. Cassius holds a Ph.D. from the University of Michigan and is a member of the Committee on Contingent Labor in the Profession. The author of *Technoprecarious* (MIT 2020), he is at work on a book about transgender people and the internet.
